## WHY THIS MATTERS NOW

Japan's Prime Minister is in India for the annual **India-Japan summit**, with the **Indo-Pacific**, semiconductors and maritime security high on the agenda. The visit makes clear that the Indo-Pacific is a durable strategic reality. **INTRODUCTION**

The visit of Japan's Prime Minister for the annual India-Japan summit is a reminder that the Indo-Pacific is no longer an American talking point that India might quietly outwait. It is a structural fact produced by geography and the distribution of power across maritime Asia.

The world's busiest trade routes and energy flows run through the Indian and Pacific Oceans; the concentration of economic weight and naval capability there makes the two oceans a single strategic theatre whether or not Washington chooses to lead. For India this is liberating rather than constraining. India's position astride the Indian Ocean's sea lanes gives it structural weight that does not depend on any patron. It can work with Japan, Australia and Southeast Asian states, through the Quad and a web of bilateral partnerships, to secure shipping lanes, build maritime domain awareness and raise the costs of coercion.

India's own framing matters here: not a bloc against any country, but a free, open and inclusive region, expressed through SAGAR and its successor vision MAHASAGAR, and consistent with strategic autonomy. The honest counterpoint is that hard power still counts, and a coalition without sustained United States naval resources may struggle to deter a determined actor.

The answer is not dependence but capability: India and its partners must build the presence and interoperability that make the region's security self-sustaining. The Indo-Pacific will persist because Asian geography and power will persist; India's task is to shape it, not to wait it out.

The Indo-Pacific is a reality India helps constitute, not a fashion it can outlast. Working with maritime partners while keeping its autonomy, India can secure the sea lanes on which its own prosperity depends.


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
