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## THE LIFT LINE

When the money that keeps a shelter open disappears, the woman fleeing violence does not disappear with it; she is simply left with nowhere to go.

## WHY THIS EDITORIAL MATTERS FOR YOUR EXAM

A UN Women report finds that at least one million women and girls have lost access to critical crisis support since early 2025, as the steepest annual fall in humanitarian aid on record forces women-led organisations in conflict and disaster zones to cut or close services, from gender-based-violence shelters to maternal health. For **GS1** this is about the condition of women and vulnerable groups; for **GS2** it is about the global humanitarian architecture and the effect of donor-country policies on the world's most exposed people.

For **Mains**, argue that development finance is a protection system, and that cutting it in a crisis is not a saving but a transfer of risk onto the most vulnerable.

## BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT

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Humanitarian and development aid is not charity at the margins; in conflict and disaster zones it is the infrastructure of survival. Much of the frontline work protecting women, running shelters for survivors of gender-based violence, providing maternal and reproductive health care, staffing safe spaces, is carried out by local, women-led organisations. They are close to the need, trusted by communities, and cheap to fund relative to the harm they prevent.

According to UN Women, this frontline is collapsing. Drawing on responses from 855 women-led organisations across 52 crisis- and conflict-affected countries, the report finds that at least one million women and girls have lost access to critical support since January 2025, a direct result of the steepest annual decline in aid on record. The timing is cruel: it reports that conflict-related sexual violence doubled in 2025, even as the systems meant to protect survivors are shutting down. Many organisations say safe spaces have closed or shrunk, demand for services has risen, and staff are working without pay to keep essentials running. This is what a protection gap looks like when it opens.

## THE CORE ARGUMENT / ISSUE

### Aid is a protection system, not a discretionary extra

Treating aid as optional spending misreads what it does. In a crisis zone, the shelter, the clinic and the safe space are the difference between a survivor being helped and being abandoned. Cutting that funding does not reduce the need; it removes the response to it. The savings are illusory because the cost reappears as violence, untreated illness and death, borne by those least able to absorb it.

### Women and girls bear the sharpest edge

Crises are not gender-neutral. When services collapse, women and girls face heightened gender-based violence, lost maternal care, and closed safe spaces, exactly the harms the funded organisations existed to prevent. That conflict-related sexual violence is reported to have doubled just as protection is withdrawn shows the two curves moving in the worst possible directions at once.

## A setback for the global gender goal

The world committed under Sustainable Development Goal 5 to achieve gender equality and empower (https://ujjayanti.com/vocab/empower/) all women and girls. Withdrawing crisis funding pushes that goal backward, undoing hard-won gains in protection and health. Backsliding in the hardest places is not a local problem; it lowers the global floor of what women and girls can expect from the international system.

### HOW TO THINK ABOUT THIS (ANALYTICAL FRAME)

Read an aid cut not as a budget line reduced but as risk transferred from wealthy donors to vulnerable women in crisis zones. The transferable rule: in humanitarian settings, financing is protection, and withdrawing it does not shrink the need but reassigns its cost to those with the least capacity to bear it, reversing development goals precisely where they matter most. Fund the frontline or forfeit the outcome.

### THE DIAGRAM IN WORDS

Steepest aid decline on record -> women-led frontline orgs cut or close -> shelters, maternal care, safe spaces shut -> at least 1 million women and girls lose support (855 orgs, 52 countries) -> GBV rises as protection falls -> SDG 5 backslides -> fix: protect and pool crisis funding + support local women-led orgs + shield frontline services

### WAY FORWARD

- ① **Ring-fence protection funding.** Shield gender-based-violence, maternal-health and safe-space services from cuts, treating them as life-saving essentials rather than discretionary programmes.
- ② **Fund local women-led organisations directly.** Channel resources to the frontline groups that are trusted, effective and cheap, and keep them solvent through pooled and flexible financing.
- ③ **Diversify humanitarian finance.** Broaden the donor base and build pooled emergency funds so protection does not collapse when a few large donors retreat.
- ④ **Hold the line on SDG 5.** Keep gender equality central in humanitarian response and development finance, tracking the protection gap so backsliding is visible and reversible.

### PYQ LINKAGE AND PRACTICE
