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Fourteen Flags, None of Them Indian: The Saudi-Led Red Sea Maritime Alliance

Saudi Arabia announced a standing multinational maritime defence coalition, with a permanent Saudi headquarters, on July 30-31, 2026, to protect shipping through the Bab al-Mandab Strait, the Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden, following Houthi threats of a maritime embargo. Fourteen states formally joined. India is not among them; Pakistan and Bangladesh are.

THE ALLIANCE, IN BRIEF

The fourteen members: Bahrain, Bangladesh, the Comoros, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan, Kuwait, Pakistan, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Sudan, Türkiye and Yemen.

Note: the Riyadh conference itself drew military officials from 43 nations plus the European Union, but conference attendance is not membership; the coalition has 14 members. Notably, the UAE and Oman did not join.

WHY BAB AL-MANDAB MATTERS

India's maritime **vulnerability** is frequently discussed in terms of the Strait of Hormuz alone. Bab al-Mandab is the second half of the problem, and the two together mean India's western maritime approaches are exposed at both ends.

Disruption at Bab al-Mandab forces shipping to divert around the Cape of Good Hope, adding roughly two weeks of transit time and substantial freight and insurance cost to India-Europe trade, a cost that flows through to Indian exporters' competitiveness and importers' input prices.

INDIA'S ABSENCE: AUTONOMY OR ABDICATION?

India has a long-established maritime security presence in exactly these waters. Indian Navy anti-piracy patrols in the Gulf of Aden have run continuously since 2008, Operation Sankalp has provided escort in the Hormuz region, and the Information Fusion Centre for the Indian Ocean Region (IFC-IOR) at Gurugram serves as a maritime domain awareness hub with international liaison officers.

What India has consistently avoided is **joining** externally-led coalitions.

The honest analytical position is that this is a genuine trade-off, not an obvious error. India's non-alignment in regional security coalitions is a long-standing, coherent doctrine that has served it well in avoiding entanglement. But the specific configuration here, a permanent, Saudi-led, HQ-hosting structure with both of India's immediate subcontinental neighbours inside it, is a harder case than a temporary, ad hoc task force would be.
