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Lebanon Becomes First Arab League State to Abolish the Death Penalty

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*Lebanon's 128-member Parliament voted on **August 11, 2026**, to formally abolish the death penalty, replacing it with life imprisonment with aggravated hard labour and retroactively commuting the sentences of roughly **84-85 death-row prisoners**, making Lebanon the first Arab League member state to legally abolish capital punishment.*

WHAT PARLIAMENT APPROVED

The bill replaces capital punishment with life imprisonment involving aggravated hard labour and applies retroactively to prisoners already sentenced to death, converting their sentences rather than leaving them in indefinite limbo on death row. Hezbollah's parliamentary bloc voted against the bill, while it otherwise secured cross-party support. The legislation is not yet in force: it must still be cleared by the Lebanese Cabinet and signed into law by President **Joseph Aoun** before taking effect.

A TWO-DECADE DE FACTO MORATORIUM MADE FORMAL

Lebanon has not carried out an execution since **January 17, 2004**, meaning the country had operated under a *de facto* moratorium for over two decades even while capital punishment remained on the statute book for offences including premeditated murder, terrorism-related crimes and certain security offences. The August 2026 vote converts that informal practice into binding law, closing the gap between Lebanon's actual practice and its formal criminal code, and pre-empting any future government from reintroducing executions by mere policy reversal.

REGIONAL AND GLOBAL CONTEXT

While Djibouti is sometimes cited in informal discussions as an Arab-world abolitionist state, its legal status is disputed, making Lebanon's 2026 law the first unambiguous, formal abolition of the death penalty by an Arab League member. The move aligns Lebanon with a broader global trend: over two-thirds of UN member states have abolished the death penalty in law or practice, and the UN General Assembly has periodically passed non-binding *moratorium* resolutions urging states to suspend executions pending full abolition.

COMPARATIVE NOTE FOR INDIA

India retains the death penalty, applying it only in the “**rarest of rare**” cases under the doctrine laid down by the Supreme Court in ***Bachan Singh v. State of Punjab*** (1980), which requires courts to weigh aggravating and mitigating circumstances before imposing a capital sentence rather than treating it as a default punishment for capital offences. India’s **Law Commission Report No. 262** (2015) went further, recommending abolition of the death penalty for all offences except terrorism-related crimes and offences against the state, reflecting an ongoing, unresolved debate about the punishment’s deterrent value versus its irreversibility. Lebanon’s abolition offers Mains answers a fresh comparative-constitutionalism example for questions on capital punishment **jurisprudence**, sitting alongside abolitionist trends in Europe and partial-abolition recommendations closer to home.

UPSC RELEVANCE
