BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT

Persistent concerns about the quality and global competitiveness of Indian higher education have driven successive reform efforts, including the **National Education Policy, 2020**, which explicitly emphasises institutional autonomy and governance reform alongside funding commitments.

THE ANALYSIS

- 1. The three-part framework allows precise diagnosis rather than a single, generic “underfunded” verdict.** Distinguishing intention, concept and execution failures lets policymakers target the actual bottleneck in a given institution, rather than assuming more money automatically fixes whatever is wrong.
- 2. Intention failures are specifically about decision-making integrity, not resource scarcity.** An institution can have adequate funding and still underperform if appointments and resource allocation are driven by non-merit considerations, a governance problem no funding increase addresses.
- 3. Concept failures highlight the risk of one-size-fits-all policy design.** A funding or reform programme designed without attention to specific institutional or regional context can be well-resourced and still poorly targeted, producing weak outcomes despite adequate investment.
- 4. Execution failures are specifically about implementation capacity, distinguishing them from design quality.** Even a well-conceived, well-funded policy fails if the institution lacks the administrative and leadership competence to actually carry it out, a capacity gap distinct from either funding or design.
- 5. The funding counter-argument should not be dismissed, and the strongest synthesis treats governance and funding as complementary, not substitutes.** Genuine international funding gaps exist for Indian higher education, and a purely governance-focused reading risks understating them; the more defensible position is that governance reform is necessary but not sufficient without adequate resources.

THE DEBATE

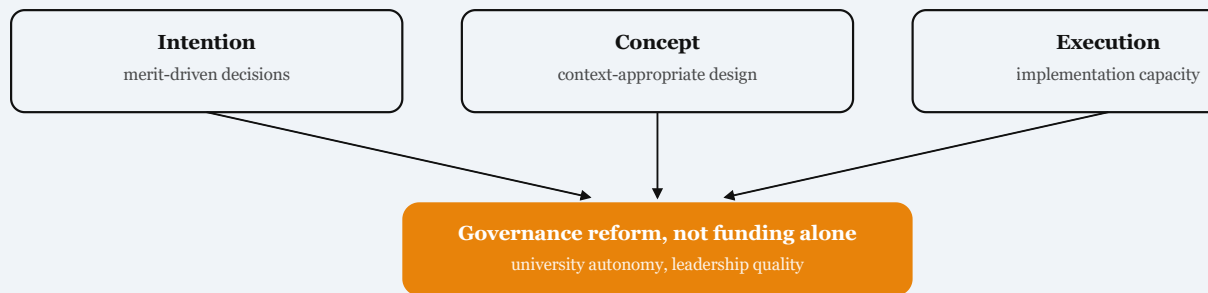
Argument AGAINST underweighting funding. Indian higher education remains genuinely underfunded relative to comparable international systems, and governance reforms cannot substitute for basic resource adequacy in infrastructure, faculty compensation and research capacity.

Balanced verdict. Governance reform and adequate funding are complementary requirements rather than competing priorities; a well-governed but underfunded institution and a well-funded but poorly governed institution will both underperform, meaning both levers need policy attention simultaneously.

HOW TO THINK ABOUT THIS

The transferable pattern: **when diagnosing why an institution or policy is underperforming, check separately whether the problem is decision-making integrity (intention), design fit (concept), or implementation capacity (execution), rather than defaulting to a single explanation like “needs more funding.”** This three-part diagnostic applies to any institutional-reform question, not education alone.

The editorial calls for strengthening university autonomy and leadership quality as governance-level interventions distinct from, and necessary alongside, adequate funding, arguing that money alone cannot fix institutions whose decision-making, design and implementation capacity remain structurally weak.
