BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT

The **Indian Institutes of Technology (IIT)** system, established beginning in the **1950s** in newly independent India, was conceived with a specific mandate: producing world-class engineers to support the country's industrial development ambitions. 2. Research commercialisation is identified as a specific capability gap. The editorial distinguishes between academic research output, publications, degrees, and research that gets translated into economically deployed innovation, arguing IITs have historically emphasised the former more than the latter relative to leading global innovation institutions.

3. Entrepreneurship support represents a distinct institutional role beyond traditional instruction. Helping graduates build companies, rather than solely preparing them for employment, requires different institutional infrastructure, incubation support, venture connections, risk-tolerant culture, than conventional engineering pedagogy.

4. Interdisciplinary collaboration addresses a structural limitation of pure engineering-focused institutions. Many contemporary innovation challenges, in areas like biotechnology, climate technology and AI, require combining engineering with other domains, an institutional capability distinct from IITs' traditional engineering-discipline strength.

5. The counter-argument about mission creep identifies a genuine implementation risk.

Expanding institutional mandate too aggressively could dilute the technical rigour that built the IIT brand, meaning the editorial's proposed reforms need careful sequencing to add new capabilities without undermining core engineering-education strength.

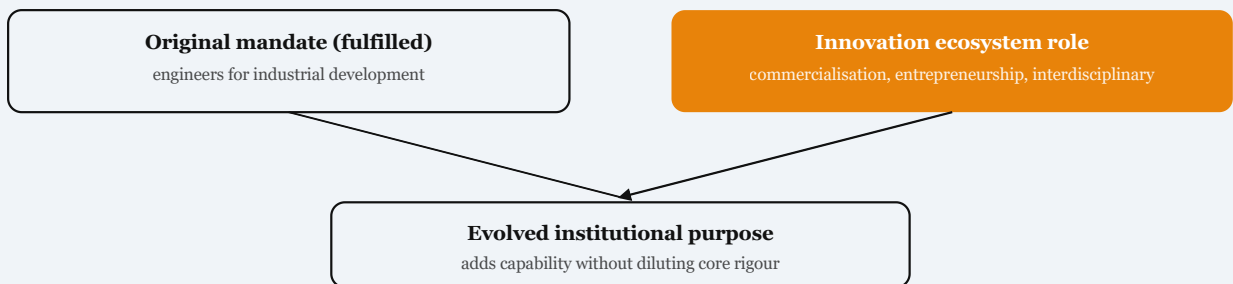
Argument AGAINST resting on past achievement (Indian Express's position). Global innovation leadership increasingly requires research commercialisation, entrepreneurship support and interdisciplinary collaboration, capabilities beyond pure engineering-degree production that IITs need to deliberately build.

Balanced verdict. Both positions are compatible if reform is sequenced carefully: preserving core engineering-education excellence while deliberately building new institutional capabilities alongside it, rather than treating mandate evolution and technical rigour as mutually exclusive, the framing the editorial itself implicitly supports.

HOW TO THINK ABOUT THIS

The transferable pattern: **when a flagship institution reaches a significant milestone after substantially fulfilling its original mandate, ask what new institutional purpose is now most valuable, while ensuring reform adds new capabilities rather than diluting the core strength that made the institution successful in the first place.** This applies across other legacy public institutions reaching similar inflection points, not IITs alone.

CONCLUSION

A complete Mains answer should treat institutional-mandate evolution as compatible with, not opposed to, preserving core strengths, since the editorial's argument is for adding new institutional capabilities alongside engineering-education excellence, not replacing one with the other.

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
