The appropriate success metric is access expansion, not private-sector displacement.** Evaluating this initiative against complete private-coaching-industry disruption sets an unrealistic bar; its more meaningful test is whether it measurably improves outcomes for previously priced-out aspirants.
- 5. This connects to India's broader DPI-based public-service delivery model.** The platform's design philosophy mirrors successful DPI initiatives like Aadhaar and UPI, applying similar open, scalable infrastructure principles to education access.

DATA AND INSTITUTIONS VAULT

PRELIMS-GRADE FACTS:

Digital Public Infrastructure (DPI) refers to foundational digital systems built as public goods, with Aadhaar, UPI and CoWIN cited as India's most prominent successful examples.

JEE (Joint Entrance Examination) and NEET (National Eligibility cum Entrance Test) are India's primary national-level engineering and medical entrance examinations respectively.

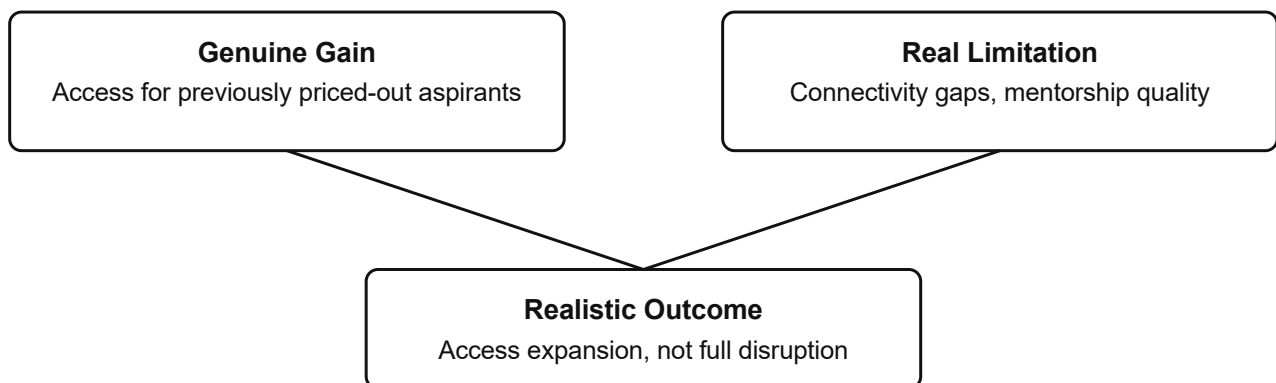

HOW TO THINK ABOUT THIS

When evaluating a technology-driven public-service intervention, separate the question of who currently has zero access to the service from who has access but at high cost. A free platform primarily benefits the first group meaningfully; benefits to the second group depend on whether the platform achieves genuine quality parity, a materially harder bar to clear.
