BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT

IPMDA was launched as a Quad initiative to address maritime-domain-awareness gaps across the Indo-Pacific, building on existing regional information-sharing infrastructure including India's **IFC-IOR**, established to serve as a maritime-security coordination hub for Indian Ocean Region states. The initiative operates against the backdrop of an estimated **\$7 trillion** in annual Indo-Pacific trade passing through regional sea lanes.

THE ANALYSIS

- 1. Grey-zone threats specifically evade conventional military deterrence.** Actions deliberately designed to remain below the threshold of open conflict are poorly countered by naval presence alone, making transparency-based tools like IPMDA a more targeted response.
- 2. Transparency functions as deterrence by removing plausible deniability.** Grey-zone activity typically relies on ambiguity; shared, real-time maritime-domain data among multiple states directly undermines this ambiguity.
- 3. India's IFC-IOR provides a genuine institutional head start.** Rather than building new maritime-domain-awareness infrastructure from scratch, IPMDA's regional expansion can **leverage** India's existing information-fusion capability.
- 4. Coalition breadth directly affects deterrent value.** IPMDA's effectiveness scales with the number of participating states sharing and acting on maritime-domain data, since a wider coalition both improves data coverage and raises the reputational cost of exposed coercive activity.
- 5. Transparency-based deterrence has genuine limits against determined state actors.** A sophisticated or state-backed actor willing to absorb reputational costs may not be fully deterred by exposure alone, meaning IPMDA complements rather than replaces other maritime-security tools.

PRELIMS-GRADE FACTS:

IFC-IOR (Information Fusion Centre-Indian Ocean Region) is based in Gurugram, India, and serves as a regional maritime-security information-sharing hub.

THE DEBATE

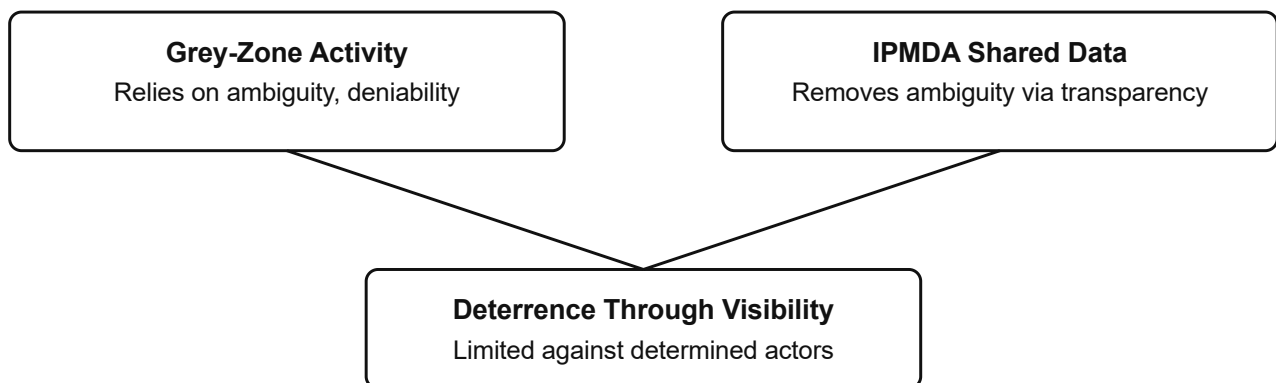
AGAINST (transparency alone cannot deter determined state actors): A sophisticated actor calculating that reputational costs are acceptable may not be meaningfully deterred by exposure through shared maritime-domain data alone.

Balanced verdict: IPMDA is best understood as a genuinely valuable but partial tool, effective against opportunistic or lower-level grey-zone activity while requiring complementary military and diplomatic instruments to address more determined, state-backed coercive activity.

HOW TO THINK ABOUT THIS

When evaluating a transparency-based security mechanism, distinguish between the threats it directly counters (those relying on ambiguity and deniability) and threats requiring other tools (those where the actor is willing to accept exposure). Understanding this boundary clarifies what a mechanism like IPMDA can realistically achieve versus where it needs complementary instruments.

• KEY ARGUMENTS AT A GLANCE

The Hindu argues that with \$7 trillion in annual Indo-Pacific trade exposed to growing grey-zone threats and maritime surveillance gaps, scaling up the Indo-Pacific Partnership for Maritime Domain Awareness (IPMDA), anchored by India's Information Fusion Centre-Indian Ocean Region (IFC-IOR), is essential to deter coercive activity and protect freedom of navigation, framing transparency itself as a form of deterrence.



SUPPORTING

- Grey-zone maritime activities, actions below the threshold of open conflict such as unmarked vessel presence, illegal fishing cover for surveillance, or ambiguous coast guard actions, are specifically difficult to deter through conventional military presence alone, making shared, transparent maritime-domain awareness a more targeted counter-measure.
- India's Information Fusion Centre-Indian Ocean Region (IFC-IOR), established as a regional maritime-information-sharing hub, already provides institutional infrastructure that IPMDA's expansion could build upon rather than replicate from scratch.



COUNTER

A counter-view holds that maritime domain awareness sharing, however well-designed, cannot by itself deter a determined state actor willing to absorb the reputational cost of exposed grey-zone activity, meaning IPMDA's deterrent effect may be more limited against sophisticated or state-backed coercive activity than against opportunistic or lower-level actors.



WAY FORWARD

The editorial's position is that scaling up IPMDA requires deeper India-U.S. cooperation alongside expanded participation from ASEAN states and smaller Pacific Island nations, since broader participation both improves the coverage and quality of shared maritime data and raises the diplomatic cost of grey-zone activity being exposed across a wider coalition of stakeholders.

INTRODUCTION

The Hindu examines the Indo-Pacific Partnership for Maritime Domain Awareness (IPMDA), arguing that scaling up this transparency-based maritime-security initiative is essential to protecting the \$7 trillion in annual Indo-Pacific trade exposed to growing grey-zone threats, with India's IFC-IOR playing an anchoring role.

BODY

The Indo-Pacific region carries an estimated \$7 trillion in annual trade through its sea lanes, making unimpeded maritime commerce a matter of significant economic consequence for all regional and extra-regional stakeholders. This trade faces growing exposure to grey-zone maritime activities, actions occurring below the threshold of open military conflict, such as ambiguous vessel presence, contested fishing-fleet activity used as surveillance cover, or coercive but not overtly militarised coast guard actions, which conventional naval deterrence is poorly suited to counter since such activities are deliberately designed to avoid triggering a clear military response.

The Indo-Pacific Partnership for Maritime Domain Awareness (IPMDA), building on India's existing Information Fusion Centre-Indian Ocean Region (IFC-IOR) infrastructure, addresses this gap through shared, transparent maritime-domain data across participating states, operating on the premise that transparency itself functions as a deterrent: grey-zone activity that relies on ambiguity and plausible deniability becomes harder to sustain when multiple states share real-time visibility into maritime activity across the region. The editorial's proposed path forward, deeper India-U.S. cooperation and expanded ASEAN and Pacific Island state participation, reflects the logic that IPMDA's deterrent value scales with the breadth of its participating coalition, since a wider network of states sharing and acting on the same maritime-domain data both improves data quality and raises the diplomatic and reputational cost of exposed coercive activity.

CONCLUSION

A complete Mains answer should recognise that transparency-based deterrence mechanisms like IPMDA address a specific category of maritime threat, ambiguous grey-zone activity, that conventional military deterrence handles poorly, making IPMDA a complementary rather than substitute tool within India's broader Indo-Pacific maritime-security strategy.

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
